Demi Lovato

The daughter of a former Dallas Cowboys cheerleader. Demi Lovato was born Demetria Devonne Lovato in Dallas, Texas, on August 20, 1992. Demi began her TV career at the age of 6 when she landed a role on TV's "Barney & Friends." She spent two seasons on the show, starring alongside best friend and future Disney star, Selena Gomez.

A 2006 appearance on "Prison Break" was followed by a regular role on the Disney channel's "As the Bell Rings" series, which also featured some of her original songs. In 2008, Demi starred with the Jonas Brothers in "Camp Rock," which commanded the year's largest cable viewing figures. After touring with the Jonas Brothers that summer, she released her debut album "Don't forget," which reached number 2 on the Billboard Charts.

Demi became Disney's latest leading lady when her series, "Sonny with a Chance," debuted in early 2009. That summer, she teamed up with fellow "Barney" alumnus Selena Gomez, star of "Wizards of Waverly Place," in the Disney channel original movie "Princess Protection Program" before releasing her sophomore album "Here We Go Again," which debuted at the top of the Billboard Charts!

James Gandolfini

James Gandolfini JR. was born in Westwood, New Jersey, on September 18, 1969. While earning a B.A. in Communications at Rutgers University, he worked as a bar bouncer and later managed a Manhattan nightclub. Acting classes led to his first stage role, playing an Elvis impersonator. Following a string of Off-Broadway Productions, he made his movie debut in the 1992 thriller "A Stranger Among US."

The same year he began a lengthy run in a Broadway production of “A Streetcar Named Desire” alongside Jessica Lange and Alec Baldwin. In 1993 he made a memorable appearance as a thug in the Tarantino—scripted movie “True Romance.”

He returned to the Broadway stage in 2009, earning a Tony nomination for his role in the comedy “God of Carnage.” In a complete change of pace, he also voiced the character of Carol in the eagerly anticipated movie adaptation of “Where the Wild Things Are.” This followed his role in the movie “The Taking of Pelham 123,” alongside Denzel Washington and John Travolta.

Universally acknowledged as a landmark in television history, “The Sopranos” ran for six seasons, garnering a host of awards, including three Emmys and a Golden Globe for Gandolfini.

Robert Carlyle

Robert Carlyle was born in Glasgow, Scotland, on April 19, 1961. Raised by his painter and decorator father, he didn’t pursue an acting career until he was in his 20s. After graduating from The Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama, he first gained attention in the U.K. with a starring role in the 1991 Kin Loach film “Riff-Raff,” before turning in a chilling performance as a murderous skinhead on episodes of the top-rated British TV drama “Cracker.” By the mid-1990s, he was the star of the BBC police series “Hamish Macbeth.”

Following his role as the psychopathic Begbie in the 1996 cult hit movie “Train Spotting,” he gained international acclaim as the leader of a troupe of amateur strippers in the surprise hit comedy “The Full Monty,” a role that earned him a Bafta Award. His reputation for versatility was enhanced in 1999, when he starred in four movies, playing the troubled father in “Angela’s Ashes,” a highwayman in “Plunkett & Macleane,” a cannibalistic explorer in “Ravenous,” and a classic Bond villain in the blockbuster “The World Is Not Enough.”

That versatility has been much in evidence in his subsequent roles, which have ranged from the romantic lead in “Marilyn Hotchkiss’ Ballroom Dancing and Charm School” to Adolf Hitler in a CBS miniseries, and have included the sword and sorcery fantasy “Eragon” and the zombie

movie “28 Weeks Later.” He earned an Emmy Award nomination for his work in the 2005 miniseries “Human Trafficking.” Following a starring role opposite Kiefer Sutherland in the TV movie “24: Redemption,” Carlyle’s latest small screen project sees him star in the sci-fi series “Stargate Universe.”

LL Cool J

Born James Todd Smith in Bay Shore, Long Island, New York, on January 14, 1968, he started making demo tapes in his early teens, using some DJ equipment that his grandfather had given him. Adopting the name LL Cool J -- an acronym for “Ladies Love Cool James” -- he was signed to the fledgling Def Jam Label at the age of 16. His first single, 1984’s “I Need a Beat,” sold over 100,000 copies, paving the way for his platinum-selling debut album “Radio.”

By the turn of the decade, LL Cool J was one of hip-hop’s biggest stars, thanks to his singles such as “I Need Love” and “I’m That Type of Guy.” The advent of Public Enemy and NWA saw his music rediscover a harder edge, as evidenced by 1990’s double-platinum album “Mama Said Knock You Out” and its Grammy-winning title track.

He also began to establish acting credentials, appearing in “The Hard Way” and “Toys.” In 1995, the year of his hit album “Mr. Smith,” he landed the starring role in the sitcom “In the House.” By the time the series ended in 1999, he was starring in movies such as “Deep Blue Sea” and “Any Given Sunday.”

Subsequent film credits included “Rollerball” and “S.W.A.T.” he enjoyed his first chart-topping album with 2000’s “G.O.A.T.” and, having collaborated with a wide range of artists, from Boyz II Men to Method Man, Redman, Canibus and DMX. He teamed up with Jennifer Lopez on the 2003 chart-topper “All I Have.”

He has also dabbled in fashion, written books and established a number of music related ventures. The 2009 fall season saw him return to the small screen, starring as special agent Sam Hanna on the "NCIS" spin-off series "NCIS: Los Angeles."

The Singing Detectives

When Edd Byrnes became a teen sensation on TV show "77 Sunset Strip," playing Kookie, a jive-talking, hair-combing parking attendant with a penchant for amateur sleuthing, the music biz was quick to cash in. He was teamed with Connie Stevens, star of spin-off detective show "Hawaiian Eye," and the 1959 novelty hit "Kookie, Kookie, Lend Me Your Comb" was born.

Connie Stevens, who played singer Cricket Blake on "Hawaiian Eye," enjoyed further chart success, hitting the top 5 in 1960 with "Sixteen Reasons."

From Ice T to LL Cool J, a number of music stars have embarked on acting careers and found themselves playing detectives on the small screen. But ever since Edd Byrnes parlayed his popularity as Kookie on the hit 1959s TV show "77 Sunset Strip" into a top 10 hit on the pop charts, a steady procession of actors, who found fame playing TV detectives, have cultivated music careers.

Of the current crop of TV sleuths, Gary Sinise, who stars as Detective Mac Taylor on "CSI: New York," plays bass in the LT. Dan Band, an outfit named after his character in the movie "Forrest Gump." Jason Schwartzman, who plays an amateur detective on the new HBO series "Bored to Death," started out as drummer with indie rockers Phantom Planet, and currently has a side project band called Coconut Records.

The swinging sixties saw the stars of shows as diverse as "Bonanza," "Batman" and "I Dream of Jeannie" on the racks of record stores, but it wasn't until the 1970s that TV detectives enjoyed significant chart success. Telly Savalas earned Emmy and Golden Globe Awards for his portrayal of New York City detective "Kojak." In 1975, his spoken word version of Bread's "If" topped the

pop charts in Europe for months. In 1976, David Soul capitalized on his role on “Starsky and Hutch” to top the charts on both sides of the Atlantic with “Don’t Give Up on Us Baby.”

“Miami Vice” star Don Johnson hit the top 5 in 1986 with his “Heartbeat” single. Bruce Willis soared to stardom as a private eye on the hit show “Moonlighting,” springboarding onto the pop charts in 1987 with “Respect Yourself.”

Perhaps the strangest spinoff came from the police sitcom “Car 54, Where Are You?” so great was the appeal of Joe E. Ross as Patrolman Gunther Toody, Roulette Records released the album “Love Songs from a Cop” in 1964, the veteran comic adding his trademark “Ooh! Ooh!” exclamations to such classics as “Are You Lonesome Tonight?”

Michael Jackson

Michael Jackson was the pop prodigy whose arrested childhood shaped an eccentric life and a spectacular fall from grace, conducted in the glare of media spotlight and tabloid scrutiny.

But his untimely death, on the eve of a historic comeback, served to remind the world of a remarkable career and unique talent. An estimated audience of one billion tuned in to the televised memorial service for a legend who was twice inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, won 13 Grammys, sold hundreds of millions of records, and is universally hailed as one of the most brilliant and innovative entertainers of all time.

Born in Gary, Indiana, on August 29, 1958, the seventh of nine children, Michael Jackson was only 6 years old when he joined his brothers Jackie, Tito, Jermaine and Marlon in the group that soon became known as The Jackson 5. The boys rocketed to stardom their first four singles, starting with 1969’s “I Want You Back” topping the Billboard charts.

Lead singer Michael, hailed as a genius and prodigy, began to sow the seeds of a solo career, with hits such as “Got to Be There” “Ben” and “Rockin’ Robin.”

Michael's 1979 solo album, "Off the Wall," was a multi-platinum smash, but it paled in comparison to his 1982 follow-up. Propelled by the title track and its landmark, ground-breaking video, "Thriller," which also includes the classics "Beat It" and "Billie Jean," topped the U.S. charts for 37 weeks. When Michael famously "moonwalked" onstage during a 1983 TV special, it marked the coronation of pop's new king.

Michael continued to perform with his brothers into the mid-1980s, but while they were filming a TV commercial together in 1984, he received burns to his scalp when a pyrotechnic explosion went away. On the business front, he purchased ATV Music, the publishing company that owned the rights to the Lennon/ McCartney songs made famous by The Beatles. He starred in a 3-D film that proved a major attraction at Disney theme parks—and then built his own private theme park on his Neverland Ranch in California!

He hit big again with the "Bad" album in 1987, broke records worldwide with a subsequent tour, and then followed up with the "Dangerous" album. But by the time of 1995's hugely successful double album "HIStory: Past, Present and Future, Book I," all was not well behind the scenes. Over the next few years, the tabloids feasted on everything from his dramatically altered appearance to his two marriages and the lineage of his three children.

Michael even teamed up with sister Janet to rail against the media in the track "Scream," which was accompanied by a video that cost a staggering \$7 million!

Disputes with his record label took a toll, but it was his notorious legal troubles, culminating in a very public trial, that finally capsized his career. Amid tales of financial woes, he kept a lower profile for years. Then in 2009, he announced a 50-date residency in London. But just weeks before his triumphant return, with more than a million tickets sold, the 50-year-old pop legend died, after suffering a cardiac arrest.

Jay-Z

Shawn Corey Carter was born on December 4, 1969, and raised in the tough Marcy Projects of Brooklyn, New York. He attended the same school as Busta Rhymes and Notorious B.I.G., where he developed an interest in music and freestyling rap. By 1990, his nickname of “Jazzy” had developed into his stage name of Jay-z, and he began to make appearances on records. Scoring an underground hit with the 1995 single “In My Lifetime,” he opted not to sign with a major label and formed his own record label, Roc-A-Fella.

It was the start of an empire that has made him one of the richest moguls in music.

His first two albums established Jay-Z as one of rap’s fastest-rising stars, but it was 1998’s multi-platinum “Vol.2...Hard Knock Life,” propelled by the hit singles “Can I Get A...” and “Hard Knock Life (Ghetto Anthem)”

-- the latter sampling the familiar “Annie” show tune — that boosted him to superstar status. It began a record-setting run of nine consecutive chart-topping albums. He has collaborated on hits with a panoply of stars, from DMX to Mary J. Blige, from The Spice Girls to Mariah Carey, as well as the superstar who went on to become his wife, Beyonce Knowles. He has earned a slew of awards, and in his role as music mogul, heading up Roc-A-Fella and later Def Jam, he launched the careers of the likes of Rihanna and Ne-Yo. His business interests range from clothing lines—he founded the hugely successful brand Rocawear—to upscale sports bars and hotels, and he is a part owner of the New Jersey Nets NBA team.

Ewan McGregor

Born in Crieff, Scotland, on March 31, 1971, Ewan Gordon McGregor dropped out of drama school to take the lead role in the 1993 BBC TV serial “Lipstick on Your Collar.” In the early days of his career, he shared an apartment with Jude Law, and the two later formed a production company with friends.

Ewan met his wife, designer Eve Mavrakis, when they worked together on an episode of the U.K. TV series “Kavanagh QC.”

McGregor made his film debut in 1993’s “Being Human.” He soon went on to star in three films for director Danny Boyle that established him as one of British cinema’s fastest-rising young stars—the dark thriller “Shallow Grave,” the cult favorite “Trainspotting” and the romantic comedy “A Life Less Ordinary.” The likes of “Velvet Goldmine” and “Life Voice” continued to showcase his versatility, and his elevation to the Hollywood “A” list was confirmed when he was cast in the “Star Wars” prequel trilogy in the role that Sir Alec Guinness had first made famous, the Jedi Knight OBI-Wan Kenobi.

As well as starring in movies as diverse as “Black Hawk Down,” “Moulin Rouge!” and “The Island,” he voiced characters in the animated features “Robots” and “Valiant.”

He was nominated for a Laurence Olivier Award for his work on the London stage in “Guys and Dolls” and went on to play Iago in a production of “Othello.” Following his portrayal of a priest in the sequel to “The Da Vinci Code,” the box office hit “Angels & Demons,” he teamed up with George Clooney in “The Men Who Stare at Goats.”

Kristen Stewart

Kristen Stewart was born in Los Angeles on April 9, 1990. Her dad is a TV producer and her mother is a script supervisor, so it was no surprise that Kristen was drawn to acting from an early age. Following a couple of small cameos, she had a well-received role in 2001’s “The Safety of Objects,” before starring opposite Jodie Foster in the 2002 thriller “Panic Room.”

She continued to rack up impressive credits throughout her early teens, with featured roles in such movies as “Cold Creek Manor,” “Catch That Kid” and “Fierce People,” as well as an acclaimed lead role in the TV movie “Speak.” More starring vehicles came her way, including “The Cake Eaters” and the horror movie “The Messengers,” and she appeared with Robert De Niro and Sean Penn in 2008’s “What Just Happened.” That same year, she appeared in the role that elevated her

to cult stardom, as Bella Swan in the vampire fantasy “Twilight,” adapted from the hugely popular Stephenie Meyer books. The movie was a box-office smash that swept the board at numerous teen award shows.

“Twilight” has blossomed into a major movie franchise, with the sequel, “The Twilight Saga: New Moon,” set to be followed in 2010 by “The Twilight Saga: Eclipse.” The series has confirmed Kristen’s leading lady status, and her upcoming projects include a portrayal of rocker Joan Jett in the upcoming biopic “The Runaways.”

The Prisoner

Before there were the James Bond movies, Patrick McGoochan, an American-born actor raised in Ireland, found fame as superspy John Drake on the British-made TV series “Danger Man,” which was also known as “Secret Agent” during its second U.S. run.

Building on that show’s success, McGoochan then co-created his own starring vehicle, and in doing so, launched one of TV’s greatest cult hits. A secret agent, whose name is never revealed but the viewer inevitably assumes is John Drake, resigns from a government agency. He is abducted and transported to a secret location, a seemingly idyllic village that is really a bizarre prison. Brainwashed residents, who dress and speak alike, and are known only by their given numbers, are constantly monitored, and any escape attempts are thwarted by a giant bouncing balloon known as Rover. Deemed number 6, the agent mounts a campaign of resistance, refusing to cooperate and constantly seeking a means of escape.

“The Prisoner” debuted in the U.K. in 1967 and premiered in the U.S. on CBS in 1968. A Kafkaesque sci-fi fantasy steeped in symbolism and allegory, it is still acclaimed as one of the most thought-provoking and intelligent series in TV history.

“The Prisoner” was filmed at the picturesque Portmeirion Resort in Wales. Rover was originally a hovercraft, but the machine broke down and sank in the sea on the first day of filming. Spotting a

nearby weather balloon. McGoohan improvised...and the killer balloon guard became one of the show's most talked-about gimmicks.

Originally intended to be a seven-part miniseries, it was soon expanded. Executive producer McGoohan also wrote and directed many of the episodes, and the punishing schedule took a heavy toll.

"The Prisoner" ended after 17 episodes... but has gone on to become a cultural touchstone, even inspiring an episode of "The Simpsons" on which McGoohan guested.

"The Prisoner" has now been remade with James Caviezel, of "The Passion of the Christ" fame, in the title role.

In the original series, the chief administrator of the village number 2, was played by 17 different actors, including Peter "Jason King" Wyngarde and Leo "Rumpole of the Bailey" McKern. In the latest version, that role is played by Sir Ian McKellen. The series, which was filmed on location in Namibia, aired in the U.S. on AMC. The channel has not only been showing the original series, it has also made all 17 episodes available to watch in full, for free, online at www.amctv.com/videos/the-prisoner-1960s-video.

James Cameron

Born in Canada, in Kapuskasing, Ontario, on August 16, 1954, James Cameron racked up credits art direction and special effects design, including John Carpenter's "Escape from New York," before making his directorial debut on "Piranha II: The Spawning" in 1981. His major breakthrough came when he wrote and directed "The Terminator" in 1984. The film was a box-office sensation and spawned two sequels and a TV series. Cameron went on to write and direct the sci-fi smashes "Aliens" and "The Abyss." By the time he made "True Lies" in 1994, he had also added producer to his impressive list of credits.

Cameron donned the mantle of writer, director, co-producer and co-editor and applied his mastery of special effects to create "Titanic" in 1997. At \$200 million, it was the most expensive movie

ever made. The gamble paid off in spectacular fashion. “Titanic” became the highest-grossing movie in history, taking \$1.8 billion worldwide, and it won eleven Academy Awards.

Cameron turned his attention to the small screen with the creation of “Dark Angel,” the 2000 TV series that propelled Jessica Alba to stardom.

Other projects have included documentaries, such as “Expedition: Bismark” and “The Lost Tomb of Jesus.”

More than 12 years after “Titanic” Cameron has now returned to movie-making with the 3-D epic “Avatar.” Four years in the making, the movie employs revolutionary new methods of computer-generated special effects and animation.

Sherlock Holmes

Sherlock Holmes, the brilliant detective created at the end of the 19th century by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, is one of the most enduring fictional characters of all time. Conan Doyle wrote four novels and 56 short stories featuring Holmes, the majority of which are narrated by his friend and assistant, Dr. John Watson. The stories inspired stage productions, and were adapted for subsequent mediums radio, film and television, as well as comic books and board games.

Sherlock Holmes has provided the blueprint for fictional detectives of every stripe. The lead character on the hit TV series “House” is based on Holmes, according to the show’s creator, David Shore. House even lives at 221B, the number of Sherlock’s Baker Street abode.

Holmes is the most frequently filmed fictional character, with well over 200 versions to date. Following a number of Scandinavian and U.K. shorts in cinema’s early silent days, the likes of John Barrymore and Raymond Massey portrayed the great detective on screen. The definitive Holmes was created by Basil Rathbone in numerous films and radio broadcasts from 1939 onward. Actors who have played Sherlock Holmes on film include Peter Cushing, Christopher Lee, Peter O’toole, Roger Moore and Charlton Heston.

In the 1980s and '90s, TV audiences were enthralled by Jeremy Brett's portrayal. Other productions have ranged from a Soviet TV series and Japanese animation to the schoolboy hero of the 1985 movie "Young Sherlock Holmes." The character has also been spoofed by the likes of John Cleese and Michael Caine.

The latest incarnation sees Robert Downey Jr. as the supersleuth, alongside Jude Law as Dr. Watson, in Guy Ritchie's "Sherlock Holmes." Upcoming takes on the tales include a TV series featuring Martin Freeman, of the original BBC version of "The Office," as Watson, and there's a comedy movie in the works that will see Sacha Baron Cohen, alias Borat and Bruno, put on the deerstalker.

The Bee Gees

Fifty years ago, a trio of young brothers first performed in cinemas in Manchester, England, beginning a journey to the stratospheric heights of pop superstardom. They have sold more 200 million records and topped the U.S. singles chart nine times. But the stunning triumphs that

The Bee Gees have enjoyed have been tempered by shattering tragedies.

After the family moved to Australia in 1958, the Gibb brothers—Barry and younger twins Robin and Maurice—began performing as a trio, adopting the name The Bee Gees. Having enjoyed chart success in Australia, the brothers returned to England in 1967, where they were immediately signed to a management deal by Robert Stigwood.

Thanks to such hits as "New York Mining Disaster 1941," "Massachusetts" and "Words" The Bee Gees were soon world stars. Success brought the usual pressures—Robin quit the group to pursue a solo career, while Maurice's marriage to fellow pop star Lulu was short-lived.

By the early 1970s, the brothers had reunited, but the hits were drying up. Abandoning their pop ballad leanings, they began to explore dance music and relocated to Miami, Florida. In 1975, "Jive Talking" rode the disco wave to soar to the top of the Billboard Charts. By their next hit, "Nights on Broadway," they had perfected their new formula, with Barry employing the falsetto

that would become the group's new signature sound. The following year, they topped the charts with "You Should Be Dancing" ...and then manager Stigwood asked them to provide the soundtrack to a movie he was producing, based on a magazine article about the disco dance culture.

"Saturday Night Fever" made John Travolta a movie star and propelled The Bee Gees to global superstardom through the best-selling soundtrack album in history. The group embarked on a run of six U.S. No. 1 singles, as well as writing chart-toppers for Yvonne Elliman and their baby brother, Andy Gibb. But by the 1980s, disco was dead, and although their writing skills provided huge hits for artists such as Dolly Parton and Kenny Rogers, Diana Ross and Barbra Streisand ...and although they've continued to sell millions of records over the years... their incredible reign at the top of the U.S. charts was over.

In 1988, the sudden death of Andy devastated his older brothers. The 30-year old had been on the verge of joining The Bee Gees as a fourth member. The Gibbs soldiered on, racking up hits and selling out concerts around the world. But following the sudden death of Maurice in 2003, the heartbroken Barry and Robin decided to retire the group name, and in recent years have worked and performed independently.

Now, on the eve of the group's 50th anniversary, they have reunited as The Bee Gees to honor Maurice's memory by celebrating their musical legacy.

Jay Sean

There aren't too many British rappers of Punjabi descent who top the U.S. charts, but that's precisely what Jay Sean did when his debut American single knocked The Black Eyed Peas from the top spot on the Billboard hot 100.

Born Kamaljit Singh Jhooti in Hounslow, London, on March 26, 1981, the son of Punjabi Sikh immigrants from India, he formed a hip-hop duo before he had even entered his teens. He later abandoned his plans to become a doctor, dropping out of medical school in London when his

music career began to take off. His stage name combines the common Indian name “Jay” with “Sean,” a derivation of “Shaan,” which means “shining star” in Punjabi.

By 2004, he was a star in Britain and India, selling millions of records and even making a cameo in a Hollywood movie. But his profile gradually faded as his relationship with his record label soured.

Freed from contractual obligations, he formed his own record label and found even greater chart success, racking up hits as far afield as eastern Europe and Japan.

In late 2008, he signed to U.S. hip-hop label cash money records and drafted label mate Lil Wayne for his 2009 debut American single, “Down.” The track soared to the top of the U.S. charts, a milestone for a solo artist of Asian origin.

Willem Dafoe

Born in Appleton, Wisconsin, on July 22, 1955, surgeon’s son William Defoe studied drama at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Changing the spelling of his name to Willem, he spent the early years of his career touring the U.S. and Europe with Wisconsin’s avant-grade Theatre X acting troupe before joining the performance group in New York City.

His role in 1980’s “Heaven’s Gate” was cut from the final version, so he had to wait until 1982’s “The Loveless” to make his screen debut. Roles in the likes of “Streets of Fire” and “To Live and Die in L.A.” led to his big break in 1986 with the role of the doomed Sgt. Elias in “Platoon,” which earned him an Oscar nomination. He starred in two of the decade’s most controversial films— “The Last Temptation of Christ,” which was condemned as blasphemous in some quarters, and the civil rights-era drama “Mississippi Burning,” which sparked controversy across the full span of the political spectrum.

His commitment to meticulous research was evidenced by his preparation for his role in “Triumph of the Spirit,” a 1989 movie about a concentration camp boxer that was filmed on

location in Auschwitz. Dafoe shed 20 pounds in weight and sparred with Mike Tyson's former trainer.

He has gone on to establish himself as one of the most accomplished and versatile actors in American cinema, with roles in movies as diverse as the dark thriller "American Psycho" and the animated blockbuster "Finding Nemo." He earned his second Academy Award nomination for his work in the 2000 horror movie "Shadow of the Vampire," but was equally at home in such lighter fare as "The Life Aquatic with Steve Zissou" and "Mr. Bean's Holiday."

Following his portrayal of the Green Goblin in the Spider-Man movies, his recent credits have ranged from "Fantastic Mr. Fox" to "Cirque Du Freak: The Vampire's Assistant" and "Daybreakers."

Phoenix

When the short-lived French guitar group Darlin' disbanded in 1993, Thomas Bangalter and Guy-Manuel De Homem-Christo formed electronic duo Daft Punk. Meanwhile, drummer Laurent Brancowitz switched to guitar and teamed up with his younger brother, Christian Mazzalai, and Christian's friends Thomas Mars and Deck D' Arcy. They honed their skills on the Paris bar circuit, playing covers of everyone from Prince to Hank Williams, adopted the name Phoenix and self-released 500 copies of their debut single.

They signed to Paris-based label Source Records and soon found themselves backing labelmates Air, which raised their profile. Their debut album, "United," was released in 2000. It would be four years before the next Phoenix album, but 2004's "Alphabetical" earned widespread critical acclaim and saw the band's music used on various TV and game soundtracks.

To promote "Alphabetical," Phoenix undertook a 150-date tour over three continents, which was captured in the release of the "Live! Thirty Days Ago" album immediately after the tour ended. The summer of 2005 was spent in Berlin, recording the 2006 album "It's Never Been Like That."

Phoenix toured the U.S. and Europe that year, and singer Mars and his partner, the award-winning film director Sofia Coppola, welcomed their first child.

The group's fifth album, "Wolfgang Amadeus Phoenix," was released in 2009. The track "1901" was used in a Cadillac commercial and became a mainstay of American airwaves, helping to bring mainstream success to Phoenix and earning the album a Grammy nomination.

Johnny Depp

Born in Owensboro, Kentucky, on June 9, 1963, and raised in Miramar, Florida, Johnny Depp played guitar in a local rock band in his teens. Having opened for the likes of Iggy Pop and Billy Idol, the group relocated to Los Angeles in search of success. When the big break failed to materialize, Johnny took a job selling pens over the phone until Nicolas Cage, who was a fan of the band, persuaded him to try his hand at acting.

Roles in the movies "A Nightmare on Elm Street," "Platoon" and "Private Resort" led to a starring role on the TV series "21 Jump Street."

More than 10,000 fan letters a month poured in, and his fee skyrocketed to \$45,000 a show. By 1990, movie stardom was beckoning, and the starring role in the offbeat "Cry-Baby" was followed by the quirky box-office smash "Edward Scissorhands."

The 1990s established him as one of the most versatile and daring actors of his generation.

The sweet "Benny & Joon" and the moving "What's Eating Gilbert Grape" contrasted with such darker fare as "The Ninth Gate" and "Sleepy Hollow," and the freaky "Fear and Loathing in Las Vegas" and "Ed Wood" were countered by the mainstream "Donnie Brasco."

His portrayal of Captain Jack Sparrow in the "Pirates of the Caribbean" movies helped make him fabulously wealthy and earned him his first Oscar nomination.

He was also nominated for "Finding Neverland" and "Sweeney Todd: The Demon Barber of Fleet Street."

Now a father of two with French singer Vanessa Paradis, he still retains the ability to surprise with his choice of roles.

Who else but Johnny Depp would follow a portrayal of gangster John Dillinger in 2009's "Public Enemies" with the Mad Hatter in "Alice in Wonderland"... and voice an episode of "Spongebob Squarepants" along the way?

Brad Pitt

He has portrayed everything from a vampire to a mountaineer and a CIA spy to a mythical Greek warrior in a glittering career that has so far won him a Golden Globe and earned him Oscar and Emmy nominations. He regularly tops the lists of the most handsome men in Hollywood, and he shares his life with one of the most beautiful actresses in Hollywood history.

On wonder Dustin Hoffman once said of Brad Pitt: "Next to that kid, we all look like onions."

William Bradley Pitt was born in Shawnee, Oklahoma, on December 18, 1963. Raised on Springfield, Missouri, he attended Kickapoo High, where he was a member of the golf, tennis and swim teams.

He dropped out of the University of Missouri to try his luck at an acting career. Arriving in Hollywood with just \$325 in pocket, he took a succession of odd jobs to support himself, including a stint in a giant chicken outfit, standing on sunset boulevard in 100-degree temperatures, promoting a fast-food chain.

Fortunately, he soon began to get acting roles, appearing in sitcoms, on the long-running soap "Another World," and landing a part on the hit drama "Dallas."

His breakthrough came with a supporting role in the movie "Thelma and Louise." Suddenly, Brad was a hot property, and a succession of movies—such as "A River Runs Through It," "Interview with the Vampire," "Legends of the Fall" and "Seven"—made him a star.

He won a Golden Globe and was nominated for an Oscar for his role in “Twelve Monkeys.” By the late 1990s, he was earning \$17.5 million a movie to star in “Meet Joe Black” and “Fight Club.” His presence at the head of a stellar ensemble cast helped make “Ocean’s Eleven” and its sequels major hits.

Other blockbusters range from the epic “Troy” to “Mr. & Mrs. Smith,” the movie that spelled the end of his four-year marriage to “Friends” star Jenifer Aniston and began his relationship with Angelina Jolie, with whom he now has a family of six children. The couple work tirelessly for humanitarian causes and have donated millions of dollars to charity.

Pitt earned a Best Actor Oscar nomination for 2008’s “The Curious Case of Benjamin Button.”

Beyonce

Born on September 4, 1981, in Houston, Texas, Beyonce Giselle Knowles was 10 years old when her first group, the sextet Girl’s Tyme, appeared on “Star Search.” Although they didn’t win, her dad, Mathew, quit his highly paid sales job to manage the group full time.

Trimming down to the quartet of Beyonce, Kelly Rowland, Latavia Roberson and Letoya Luckett, they survived one record deal that fizzled out and signed to Columbia as Destiny’s Child in 1995. By the end of the decade, such hits as “Bills, Bills, Bills” and “Say My Name” had taken them to the top of the charts worldwide. But success came with a price. A contract dispute led to the departure of Latavia and Letoya and the introduction of Michelle Williams and Farrah Franklin. Then within weeks, Farrah was out, leaving the girls to soldier on as trio.

By 2001, when Beyonce starred in the MTV movie “Carmen : A Hip Hopera,” Destiny’s Child had won a handful of Grammys and a host of other awards, and sold more than 33 million records. With the group on hiatus to concentrate on solo projects, Beyonce starred in “Austin Powers in Goldmember” and released such huge hits as “Crazy in Love.” Her debut solo album, “Dangerously in Love,” sold more than 4 million copies and earned 5 Grammy Awards.

Following a reunion album and worldwide tour, Destiny's Child disbanded in 2005. Beyonce has gone on to star in such movies as "The Pink Panther" and "Dreamgirls," and landed highly lucrative product endorsements. Platinum-selling albums "B'Day" and "I am....Sasha Fierce" and hits such as "Single Ladies (Put a Ring on It)" have kept her at the top of the charts. Beyonce wed longtime boyfriend and collaborator Jay Z in 2008.

Jonathan Rhys Meyers

Jonathan Rhys Meyers was born in Dublin, Ireland, on July 27, 1977. A serious heart condition kept him confined to hospital for several months as an infant. He and his three brothers were subsequently raised by their mother in County Cork. He left school at 16, with no real ambitions or prospects, but was discovered by a casting agency.

He made his acting debut in a soup commercial before landing a small role in the 1994 movie "A Man of No Importance." He went on to appear in projects as diverse as the film "Michael Collins," opposite Liam Neeson, and the 1996 TV movie "Samson and Delilah." His big break came with a memorable portrayal of a "glam" rock star, opposite Ewan McGregor and Christian Bale, in 1998's "Velvet Goldmine."

He went on to land starring roles in the BBC's epic production of "Gormenghast" and the 2002 TV adaptation of "The Magnificent Ambersons." That same year, "Bend It Like Beckham" was a surprise box-office hit, earning Jonathan Legions of new admirers worldwide.

The CBS miniseries "Elvis" earned him a Golden Globe Award and an Emmy nomination for his portrayal of the legendary rocker. "Match Point" and "Mission: Impossible III" were followed by "The Tudors," the hit TV series that has so far earned him two consecutive Golden Globe nominations for his portrayal of King Henry VIII.

For his return to the big screen, Rhys Meyers teamed with John Travolta for the buddy cop movie "From Paris with Love."

Leonardo DiCaprio

Leonardo Wilhelm DiCaprio was born in Los Angeles on November 11, 1974. His young parents split up within a year and Leo was raised in Hollywood by his mother. His dad remarried and Leo became close to his stepbrother, Adam, a budding child actor. Learning that Adam had been paid \$50,000 to appear in a TV commercial, young Leo hounded his parents to help him break into showbiz.

Leo made more than 20 TV commercials and landed guest spots on "Roseanne" and "The New Lassie" before winning a regular role on "The Outsiders." He starred in "Santa Barbara," and in a sitcom based on the movie "Parenthood." Soon after, Leo joined the hit TV series "Growing Pains."

His big breakthrough came when he beat out 400 hopefuls to star opposite Robert De Niro in 1993's harrowing "This Boy's Life."

His portrayal of a challenged teen in "What's Eating Gilbert Grape" earned him an Oscar nomination. Movies such as "The Quick and the Dead," "The Basketball Diaries" and "William Shakespeare's Romeo + Juliet" established Leo's reputation as one of Hollywood's brightest young stars.

Global superstardom came with the record-breaking success of 1997's epic "Titanic," his portrayal of the doomed Jack Dawson had females swooning and critics raving. After making "The Man in the Iron Mask" and "The Beach," Leo took a lengthy break. He returned with "Gangs of New York" and "Catch Me If You Can," which were followed by "The Aviator" and "Blood Diamond," both of which earned him Best Actor Oscar nominations.

After starring opposite Jack Nicholson in "The Departed" and Russell Crowe in "Body of Lies," he reunited with "Titanic" Co-stars Kate Winslet and Kathy Bates for "Revolutionary Road."

Justin Bieber

A couple of years ago, he was just a star-struck kid posting a video of his talent show performance online.

Now, following a whirlwind, fairy-tale rise to stardom, 15-year-old Justin Bieber is one of the hottest stars in the pop firmament. The video for his debut single alone has been viewed over 100 million times on You Tube!

Born in Canada, in Stratford, Ontario, on March 14, 1994, Justin Bieber taught himself to play piano, guitar, trumpet and drums. He enjoyed his first success as a performer when he entered a local singing contest in 2006. Despite competing against kids who had trained with vocal coaches, Justin's natural ability shone through and he earned second place. Justin and his mom began posting videos of him covering songs by the likes of Usher, Ne-Yo and Justin Timberlake online, so that friends and relatives could also see him. He quickly became a YouTube phenomenon, and those videos attracted hundreds of thousands of views... including some major movers and shakers in the music business.

Scott "Scooter" Braun, who also guides the career of rap sensation Asher Roth, took Justin under his managerial wing. Soon, Usher and Justin Timberlake were involved in a bidding war to sign the youngster. Usher won out, and in late 2008, 14-year-old Justin put pen to paper on a major label record deal. His two-part debut album, "My World," broke records before it was even released! Four pre-album singles, including the lead single "One Time," hit the charts, making Justin the first solo artist in history to have four Billboards to 40 hits before the release of a debut album.

Justin toured with Taylor Swift and undertook a whirlwind media blitz, becoming a familiar face on all the TV networks. By the end of 2009, which culminated in a televised performance at the White House for the President and First Lady, Justin was a platinum-selling phenomenon destined for global pop superstardom.

The Runaways

A quintet of teenage girls guided by rock impresario and record producer Kim Fowley, The Runaways emerged from the Hollywood glam-rock scene in 1975. Formed by guitarist Joan Jett and drummer Sandy West, the lineup was completed by bassist Micki Steele. 15-year-old singer Cherie Currie and 16-year old lead guitarist Lita Ford.

Steele soon left, later to resurface with The Bangles, and she was eventually replaced by Jackie Fox.

The Runaways' self-titled debut album, which featured the single "Cherry Bomb," was released in 1976. Headline tours followed, with the likes of Van Halen and Cheap Trick as support bands. By the time of the group's second album, 1977's "Queens of Noise," The Runaways were hugely popular in Japan, where they enjoyed superstar status. But internal conflicts saw the departure of Fox and then Currie, who embarked on a solo career. Vicki Blue joined on bass, and was subsequently replaced by Laurie McAllister. Having parted ways with manager Fowley in 1978, The Runaways disbanded in early 1979.

Lita Ford enjoyed tremendous success as a solo artist, with hit singles such as "Kiss Me Deadly" and the 1992 chart-topper "Playing with Fire."

Joan Jett went on to top the charts with her band The Blackhearts and the anthemic "I Love Rock 'n' Roll." A successful label mogul and record producer, she has also appeared in movies and on numerous TV drama shows, and has starred on the Broadway stage. Sandy West continued in music, but tragically succumbed to cancer in 2006. Jackie Fox attended Harvard and became a lawyer, while Vicki Blue became an Emmy-nominated TV and film producer/ director. Cherie Currie embarked on acting career and is still involved in music. Based on Currie's 1989 autobiography, the new biopic "The Runaways" sees her portrayed by Dakota Fanning, while "Twilight" star Kristen Stewart stars as Joan Jett.

Carey Mulligan

Born in London on May 28, 1985, Carey Mulligan was educated in Germany and England, and fell in love with acting at a very early age. Turned down by three acting schools, the 18-year-old seemed destined for University studies and an English degree until she wrote to Oscar-winning screenwriter Julian Fellowes, who had been a guest speaker at her school. He introduced her to a casting agent, and Carey landed a role opposite Keira Knightley in 2005's "Pride & Prejudice." She was soon a regular face on British TV, appearing in everything from period dramas, such as "Bleak House" and "Northanger Abbey," to a Miss Marple mystery and even an episode of the sci-fi series "Doctor Who."

She starred in a revival of "The Seagull" that had theater critics in London and New York raving about her acting, and followed a minor role in the 2007 British film "And When Did You Last See Your Father?" with roles in the Johnny Depp movie "Public Enemies" and "The Greatest," opposite Pierce Brosnan and Susan Sarandon.

But it was her performance as the schoolgirl lead in 2009's "An Education" that catapulted her onto every major awards slate. She has spoken of a desire to still attend drama school. But with a steady stream of major movie projects in the pipeline—including a starring role opposite Michael Douglas and Shia Labeouf (with whom she has recently been romantically linked) in Oliver Stone's "Wall Street: Money Never Sleeps"—she may struggle to find time for school in her schedule!

Jim Carrey

Born in Canada, in Newmarket, Ontario on January 17, 1962, Jim Carrey began doing stand-up comedy in his teens, and by the age of 19 was headlining comedy clubs in Toronto. Moving to Los Angeles, he began to make inroads in film and TV, landing the lead in the short-lived sitcom "The Duck Factory" and appearing in movies as diverse as "The Dead Pool," with Clint

Eastwood, and the sci-fi farce “Earth Girls Are Easy.” He showcased his broad, rubber-faced physical comedy in the sketch show “In Living Color” before taking the title role in 1994’s low-budget “Ace Ventura: Pet Detective.” Although the movie was roundly panned by the critics, the public flocked to it in droves and the character became a pop culture sensation!

That same year saw the release of two more huge hits—“The Mask” and “Dumb and Dumber.” By the end of 1994, Jim Carrey was a superstar.

1995 brought even more success, with an Ace Ventura sequel and a high-profile portrayal of The Riddler in “Batman Forever.”

Carrey’s fee for 1996’s “The Cable Guy,” directed by Ben Stiller, was an astronomical \$20 million. A dark comedy, its box office performance was not up to Carrey’s usual stellar standards, but he quickly returned to form with the lighter “Liar Liar.” He won back-to-back Golden Globes for 1998’s “The Truman Show” and the following year’s “Man on the Moon.” He began the new millennium with two smash hits “Me, Myself and Irene” and “How the Grinch Stole Christmas.”

“Bruce Almighty” topped the box office charts worldwide in 2003, becoming one of the highest-grossing comedies in movie history. The following year, the quirky “Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind” earned Carrey his sixth Golden Globe nomination, and many felt he was unlucky not to gain Oscar recognition. He has continued to star in smash hit comedies, such as “Fun with Dick and Jane” and “Yes Man,” and has taken on roles in such blockbuster fantasy fare as “Lemony Snicket’s A Series of Unfortunate Events,” “Horton Hears a Who!” and “A Christmas Carol” ...while continuing to challenge his audience with more dramatic roles, as in “The Number 23” and “I Love You Phillip Morris.”

Sade

Born Helen Folosade Adu in Ibadan, Nigeria, on January 16, 1959, Sade (pronounced Shah –Day) was four years old when she moved to Britain with her brother and their English mother. She studied fashion design at art school in London before setting up her own design company after

graduation. She also did a little work as a photographic model, and began performing with a Latin soul band called Arriva before moving on to join the band Pride.

In 1982, she teamed up with bandmates Stuart Matthewman and Paul Spencer Denman to form a splinter group, which they named after their strikingly attractive lead singer. Recruiting fourth member Andrew Hale, Sade quickly began to attract record company interest. The group's debut single, "Your Love is King," hit the top 5 on the U.K. pop charts, paving the way for the debut album "Diamond Life" to go multi-platinum.

Singles such as "Smooth Operator" and "The Sweetest Taboo" helped Sade break big in the states and win a Best New Artist Grammy Award. In the summer of 1985, the band's set at Live Aid was broadcast to a worldwide audience of 1.4 billion people. By the end of the decade, they had established themselves as one of the top adult contemporary hitmakers in the world.

The early 1990s saw the group's music featured in such movies as "Philadelphia" and "Indecent Proposal," while they continued to release multi-platinum albums. A lengthy hiatus followed, during which time Sade married and divorced, lived in Spain and Jamaica, and started a family.

The group's subsequent output has been sporadic, with 2000's "Lovers Rock" album their only offering of new material until the recent "Soldier of Love" album, which debuted at the top of the U.S. album charts, adding to the career tally of 50 million worldwide album sales!

Robert Downey Jr.

Born in New York on April 4, 1965, the son of actor parents, Robert Downey Jr. has been appearing in movies since he was 5 years old.

At the age of 20 he joined the cast of "Saturday Night Live," and he soon began to gain attention for his work in such mid-1980s movies as "Weird Science" and "Back to School." Starring roles in the likes of "Less Than Zero" and "1969" followed, and by the turn of the decade, he was starring opposite Mel Gibson in the big-budget action comedy "Air America."

Robert earned huge critical acclaim and Academy Award and Golden Globe Award nominations for his portrayal of comedy legend Charlie Chaplin in the 1992 biopic “Chaplin,” and he cemented his reputation with roles in “Natural Born Killers” and “Richard III.”

But off screen, he battled personal demons as his life spiraled downward. By the end of the 1990s, the Hollywood superstar was incarcerated in a California state prison.

Following his release, he joined the cast of the hit TV show “Ally Mcbeal.” His performances brought an Emmy nomination and earned him a Golden Globe—but he was written out after failing in his battle for sobriety and falling foul of the authorities again.

His marriage to actress Deborah Falconer was over and his career seemed dead in the water. At his lowest ebb, Robert reached out and sought professional help and by 2003, was clean and sober. With roles in such movies as “The Singing Detective” and “Gothika,” he began to win back the trust of the movie industry, and found personal happiness with marriage to producer Susan Levin.

His professional rehabilitation was completed with his starring role in the 2008 blockbuster “Iron Man.” That same year, he turned in a stellar performance as the pigmentally altered Kirk Lazarus—a “dude playing the dude, disguised as another dude”— in the smash-hit comedy “Tropic Thunder,” for which he earned Oscar and Golden Globe nominations. Having won a Golden Globe for 2009’s “Sherlock Holmes,” he looks set to conquer the box office once more with “Iron Man 2.”

Martin Lawrence

Born in Frankfurt Am Main, West Germany, on April 16, 1965, where his father was serving in the U.S. military, Martin Lawrence was raised in Maryland. Although he excelled at boxing as a teen, after graduating from high school he moved to Los Angeles to pursue a career in comedy. A run on the TV series “Star Search” led to a role on the sitcom “What’s Happening Now!!”

He made his movie debut in 1989 in Spike Lee's "Do the Right Thing" and went on to appear in "House Party 2" and the Eddie Murphy vehicle "Boomerang."

1992 was a banner year for Lawrence. Music mogul Russell Simmons chose him to host "Def Comedy Jam," the hit HBO series that helped boost the careers of such comedians as Chris Tucker, Dave Chappelle and Bernie Mac. He also debuted his sitcom "Martin," and it quickly became one of the highest-rated shows on the fledgling Fox Network. "Martin" ran for five seasons and 132 episodes, and ended in 1997. The 1995 movie "Bad Boys" paired Martin with rapper Will Smith, the star of "The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air," turning two sitcom stars into action heroes.

Just weeks before the release of his 1999 movie "Blue Streak," he narrowly avoided death after collapsing with heat exhaustion while jogging in extreme temperatures. Martin was in a coma for three days, breathing with the aid of a respirator, but recovered in time to see "Blue Streak" top the box office charts. He has gone on to star in the likes of "Wild Hogs," with John Travolta and Tim Allen, and has enjoyed blockbuster success with the sequels "Bad Boys 2" and "Big Momma's House 2."

Amy Lee of Evanescence

Amy Lee, the lead singer with Grammy-winning rockers Evanescence, was born in Riverside, California, on December 13, 1981. Her dad was a DJ and the family moved frequently, eventually settling in Little Rock, Arkansas. Amy took classical piano lessons for 9 years and went on to enroll at Middle Tennessee State University to study music theory and composition.

By that point, she was already well on the way to rock stardom. She met guitarist Ben Moody at a youth camp when she was 13 and he was 14, and within a month they were performing in local bookstores and coffee houses. Choosing the name Evanescence, which means "to fade from sight," they recruited band members, gigged extensively and issued a series of releases.

The band's 2003 major label debut album, "Fallen," spent 43 weeks in the Billboard top 10, sold nearly 20 million copies worldwide and spawned the smash-hit single "Bring Me to Life." The debut also earned them two Grammy Awards. But the success was tempered by the departure of founding member Moody, who quit during a European tour.

A live album, "Anywhere but Home," was followed by the band's sophomore studio album, "The Open Door," in 2006. It topped the U.S. charts, but inner conflicts saw the departure of three more band members.

Outside of Evanescence, Amy has collaborated with such bands as Seether and Korn, and contributed a track to a cover album of songs from the movie "The Nightmare Before Christmas." She married therapist Josh Hartzler in 2007.

The eagerly awaited third Evanescence studio album will drop in the fall of 2010.

Muse

Although his dad had been a member of The Tornados, the British beat group that topped the U.S. charts in 1962 with the novelty hit "Telstar," Matthew Bellamy grew up in Teignmouth, Devon, an English seaside town not readily associated with the world of rock music.

So it wasn't until Rocket Baby Dolls—a band formed by Bellamy and his college friends Christopher Wolstenholme and Dominic Howard—won a local battle of the bands contest in 1994, that they began to think seriously about a future in music.

The trio changed the band name to Muse and struck up a relationship with the owner of a recording studio. Early releases found success on the U.K. indie singles charts, but major British labels were slow to catch on, leading Muse to sign separate deals with labels in a number of territories around the world. The debut studio album, "Show Biz," was released in 1999 and achieved minor success.

Subsequent albums fared progressively better, mirroring the band's growing popularity. 2003's "Absolution" debuted at the top of the British charts, and yielded the group's first top ten hit single, "Time Is Running Out." The highlight of a worldwide stadium tour in 2004 was the band's appearance at the Glastonbury Festival...but minutes after Muse left the stage in triumph, Dominic's dad, who was in attendance, collapsed and died.

In 2006, the "Black Holes and Revelations" album took Muse to the top of the charts in a number of countries, including the U.K. and Australia. Thanks, in part, to the huge success of the epic single "Knights of Cydonia," the album broke the top ten on the U.S. charts. The band continued to circumnavigate the globe, playing to sold-out crowds from Asia to the U.S. and heading giant festivals. In 2009, the band's fifth studio album, "The Resistance," topped the charts in 19 countries and hit the top three on the U.S. charts, completing Muse's journey from a sleepy English seaside town to the pinnacle of rock stardom.

Doctor Who

The longest-running sci-fi TV show in the world, "Doctor Who," debuted on BBC television in Britain on November 23, 1963. The show follows the adventures of a time lord who roams through time and space in the TARDIS, a spacecraft disguised as an old-fashioned London police box. (TARDIS is an acronym for "Time and Relative Dimension in Space.") The original series was so low-budget that when the script called for six Daleks, the evil aliens in tank-like machines that are The Doctor's greatest foes, the producers had to pad out the numbers with two cardboard cutouts on which were pasted photos.

William Hartnell was the first actor to portray The Doctor. When he left the series in 1966, the producers hit upon a novel way to introduce his replacement. They decided that time lords have the ability to regenerate, thus allowing them to incorporate the introduction of Patrick Troughton into the storyline. A succession of actors has since taken on the role. Each Doctor has been accompanied by companions, and among those who have filled that role are actress Billie Piper,

comedienne Catherine Tate and pop star Kylie Minogue. The mid-1969s was The Doctor on the big screen, with veteran horror star Peter Cushing in the title role.

“Doctor Who” became a cult favorite on North American TV in the 1970s, when the lead was played by Jon Pertwee and then Tom Baker. They were followed by Peter Davison, Colin Baker, and then Sylvester McCoy, who was the incumbent when the show went on hiatus in 1989. It returned briefly in the mid-1990s, with Paul McGann as The Doctor. The show returned in 2005 with Christopher Eccleston, star of such movies as “Elizabeth” and “G.I. Joe: The Rise of Cobra,” as the ninth Doctor, before David Tennant began a five-year stint.

“Doctor Who” has now been seen in over 40 countries around the world and is a jewel in the crown of BBC America. The latest series stars Matthew Smith in the eleventh TV incarnation of the galaxy-surfing time lord.

Usher

Born in Dallas, Texas, on October 14, 1978, Usher Raymond IV was raised in Chattanooga, Tennessee, by his single mother, who later moved the family to Atlanta, Georgia, when Usher was 12. He began entering talent shows, where he was spotted by a scout for the LaFace record label. He was a talented football player, but any thoughts of a sports career were abandoned with the release of his debut single, “Call Me a Mack,” just weeks before his 15th birthday.

His self – titled debut album came out in 1994, after which he spent the next three years honing his performing skills and preparing to graduate from high school. His 1997 “My Way” album, with the hit singles “You Make Me Wanna” and “Nice & Slow,” established Usher as a major star. Branching out into TV, he starred on “Mocsha” and “The Bold and the Beautiful,” and he starred in such movies as “The Faculty” and “She’s All That.”

The “8701” album spawned the chart – topping hits “Pop Ya Collar” and “U Got It Bad,” and was followed by a slew of awards, including back-to-back Best Male R&B Grammys. In 2004, Usher went supernova! His “Confessions” album sold more than 1 million copies in the first week and produced a string of number one singles. He became the third artist, following The Beatles and

The Bee Gees, to have three singles in the top 10. Thanks in part to his “My Boo” duet with Alicia Keys, he spent 28 weeks at the top of the U.S. pop charts in 2004. His fifth studio album, 2008’s “Here I Stand,” also topped the chart worldwide.

Having founded his own record label, Usher has recently been instrumental in guiding the careers of artists such as Justin Bieber.

Green Day

Billie Joe Armstrong was born in Oakland, California, on February 17, 1972, the youngest of six kids. He was only 5 years old when he recorded the single “Look for Love” for a local label.

He got his first guitar when he was 11, a blue Fender Replica that he still plays to this day. In his early teens he formed a punk trio called Sweet Children, with his best friend Mike Dirnt on bass. By 1990, Tre Cool occupied the drum stool and the group had taken the name Green Day.

Constant touring, with the boys crammed into a converted bookmobile and Tre’s dad on driving duties, helped Green Day graduate from cult status and small indie label releases to a major record deal. The “Dookie” album was released in 1994 and catapulted the band into the mainstream, selling 10 million copies in the U.S. alone and earning them a Grammy Award. The subsequent albums “Insomniac,” “Nimrod” and “Warning” consolidated that success and spawned the chart-topping singles “Good Riddance (Time of Your Life)” and “Minority.”

But just as it seemed that Green Day’s star might be on the wane, the trio roared back with 2004’s critically acclaimed “American Idiot,” a worldwide smash that contained a string of chart-topping hits.

The “American Idiot” album earned Green Day a Grammy, as did the single “Boulevard of Broken Dreams.” Lengthy tours and sundry side projects...including a cameo role in “The Simpsons” movie and an “American Idiot” stage musical... meant that the band didn’t release a studio album until “21st Century Breakdown” in 2009. The Grammy-winning album hit the top spot in more than a dozen countries.

Summer 2010 sees the release of the “Green Day: Rock Band” video game.

Lea Michele

Born Lea Michele Sarfati in the Bronx, New York, on August 29, 1986, she was only 8 years old when she made her Broadway debut, playing the role of young Cosette in Toronto and New York, and then the Broadway revival of “Fiddler on the Roof.”

She attended high school in Tenafly, New Jersey, but continued to pursue her stage work, originating the role of Wendla in the first workshops of “Spring Awakening.”

She starred in a regional production of “The Diary of Anne Frank,” before being offered her dream role of Eponine in “Les Miserable.” But she turned the offer down, electing to stay with “Spring Awakening” as it graduated from off-Broadway to Broadway. Her decision was vindicated when the show became a hit and earned her a Drama Desk Award nomination.

Mainstream success came with the TV series “Glee,” which debuted in May 2009. The role of aspiring diva Rachel Berry, which was created with Lea in mind, has so far earned her SAG Award and a Golden Globe nomination.

Sir Ridley Scott

Born in the northeast region of England on November 30, 1937, Ridley Scott earned an M.A. in Graphic Design at the Royal College of Art. He landed a job as a set designer at the BBC and worked his way up to directing drama and adventure shows before teaming up with younger brother Tony to form a film and TV production company.

Ridley became one of the U.K.’s most celebrated TV commercial directors before graduating to feature films with 1977’s “The Duelists.”

His first major movie, the 1979 sci-fi hit “Alien,” took in over \$100 million worldwide. His 1984 TV commercial introducing the first Macintosh computer has been hailed as a masterpiece.

In the ‘80s Scott took on subjects as diverse as “Blade Runner,” “Legend,” “Someone to Watch over Me” and “Black Rain.”

“Thelma & Louise”—the 1991 movie starring Susan Sarandon and Geena Davis that catapulted Brad Pitt to stardom—was a success, but following the likes of the tepid “1492: Conquest of Paradise,” Scott took a lengthy hiatus from movie making, forming another film and TV production company with Tony Scott. The brothers have gone on to produce such hit TV shows as “Numbers” and “The Good Wife.”

He returned to movies with the hugely successful “Gladiator” in 2002, which won five Oscars, and followed that with the blockbuster “Hannibal.” Two movies with Orlando Bloom, “Black Hawk Down” and “Kingdom of Heaven,” were both box office hits, and he has collaborated four more times with Russell Crowe since “Gladiator”—on “A Good Year,” “American Gangster,” “Body of Lies” and, most recently, “Robin Hood.” He was knighted in 2003.

Jackie Chan

Actor, director, producer, writer, stuntman and choreographer, Jackie Chan has achieved his dream of global stardom—but in the process, broken practically every bone in his body! He’s also a successful singer, and his business interests range from restaurants to gyms to clothing lines.

Jackie Chan was born Chan Kong-Sang in Hong Kong, on April 7, 1954. When Jackie was 6, his parents relocated to Australia, while he stayed in Hong Kong to attend the China Drama Academy, where he was schooled in acrobatics, music, mime and martial arts, training as much as 19 hours a day.

Jackie was chosen to be a member of a school troupe called The Seven Little Fortunes. They became stage stars and appeared in a number of Chinese movies. Like Jackie, troupe members Sammo Hung Kam-Bo and Biao Yuen went on to achieve fame in Asian film. ("The Three Brothers" even starred together in a number of popular movies.)

Jackie began to establish a reputation as a gifted movie stuntman and martial artist. Following the death of the legendary Bruce Lee in 1973, Chan emerged as Asia's biggest action star, combining fighting skills with slapstick comedy and balletic grace in a series of box-office hits.

With each movie, the stunts got more daring and the onscreen mayhem even wilder—until, finally, the rest of the world was ready for Jackie. "Rumble in the Bronx" was a hit in the United States, and he was honored with an MTV Lifetime Achievement Award.

His 1999 comedy opposite Chris Tucker, "Rush Hour," was a critical and commercial success, spawning two hit sequels and paving the way for the likes of "Shanghai Noon," "Shanghai Knights" and "The Tuxedo." He also voiced a character in the animated "Kung Fu Panda."

A UNICEF Goodwill Ambassador, Jackie has long used his celebrity status to promote good causes and has raised millions of dollars for charitable groups. A percentage of all his business interests is donated to charity.

His latest screen outing sees him team with Jaden Smith, the son of Will Smith and Jada Pinkett Smith, in a remake of "The Karate Kid."

Cristiano Ronaldo

Soccer superstar Cristiano Ronaldo is the most expensive player in the sport's history—but his career was almost over before it had begun.

Born in Funchal, Madeira, Portugal, on February 5, 1985, he was diagnosed with a heart defect at the age of 15 and had to undergo corrective laser surgery.

Fully recovered, Ronaldo built his reputation at Sporting Clube De Portugal, where he caught the eye of England's Manchester United, who paid a transfer fee in the region of \$20 million to sign him in 2003.

In Ronaldo's 6 seasons with United, they won 3 English Premier League Championships and captured the jewel in crown of European club soccer, the UEFA Champions League.

Ronaldo was showered with individual honors. In 2008, he won the Golden Shoe Award as top goal scorer in Europe. That same year, he won the Ballon d'Or European Footballer of the Year award and was elected FIFA World Player of the Year.

In the summer of 2009, Spanish giant Real Madrid smashed the world transfer record paying more than \$130 million to acquire his services. 80,000 ecstatic fans showed up at the stadium just to welcome him!

Ronaldo made his debut for the Portugal national team at the age of 18 and played and scored in the Euro 2004 and Euro 2008 tournaments, the 2004 Olympics and the World Cup of 2006. Recently appointed captain of Portugal, he carries a nation's hopes on his shoulders at this summer's 2010 World Cup.
